The 1000 School Libraries Campaign

We are here today as part of the 1000 school libraries campaign which was launched by the Minister for Basic Education, Mrs. Angie Motshekga at Uvuyo primary school in Dobsonville in Soweto on 22 July 2015. This campaign seeks to built, refurbish and resource 1000 school libraries per year. We are happy to say that in the province,

Sitintile secondary and Tenteleni primary are beneficiaries of this campaign.

The 1000 school libraries campaign has given us an opportunity to rally energies with other activities for the month of September such as National Spelling Bee, Drop All and Read, Early Grade Reading Assessment, Book Week and International Literacy Day to conscientise communities about the promotion of reading and support for libraries.

The 2012 General Household Survey

It is really a matter of concern that there are great numbers of people who are illiterate in the country this is indeed a sad story but doing something about it is very comforting.

According to the 2012 General Household Survey (GHS) conducted by Statistics South Africa (StatsSA), adults over the age of 15, whose level of education was lower than Grade 7, were asked whether or not they are able to, have some difficulty, or have a lot of difficultly in writing their name, reading, filling in a form, writing a letter, calculating monetary change or reading road signs.

The survey found about 2.643 million people in South Africa who have some or a lot of difficultly reading, or are unable to read. This corresponds to almost 7% of the adult population.

It is this sad development that spurs us on as government and the private sector to forge ahead with the eradication of illiteracy. It is thus our intention to change this situation for the better and all our efforts feed into that.

MEC Book Club

As part of an initiative to inspire reading and the freeing of the mind, we have since 21 July 2015 requested all citizens of Mpumalanga to make time every day to read a book.

In this endeavour, the Mpumalanga Department of Education has collaborated with various institutions and organisations including Vodacom, Shuter and Shooter and the Nelson Mandela Foundation to mount an aggressive Reading Campaign.

Part of this campaign was the establishment of the MEC's Book Club in which I prescribe three books to be read by members of the club who in turn publish their reviews on the departmental website page.

This act is designed to inspire and share the reading journey bringing a whole new perspective and insight to the reading experience. It is also our view that having the opportunity to analyze writing with fellow readers can only help one gain a greater understanding of the writing and reading process.

On top of that, the Department of Education has collaborated with Ilanga Mall with regards to the Book Flood, a campaign to ensure that individuals, organisations and companies donate books and other reading materials such s magazines to be distributed to schools.

To conscientise our communities about the importance of reading and literacy, we have celebrated the International Literacy Day on the 08 September 2015 at KaMhlushwa Primary School focusing on the Drop All and Read campaign at schools and home. This campaign was also extended to the religious and civic communities for buy in.

Public libraries are considered fundamental to the development and upliftment of communities. Access to libraries creates and sustains a reading culture. The value of libraries in terms of support of literacy, education, and the principle of lifelong learning forms an integral part of our modern democracy.

To ensure the provision of these services, the Department of Culture, Sport and Recreation and the Mbombela Local Municipality have committed to improving public library access in all communities, developing and sustaining a culture of reading and the provision of access to information for all.

It is in that light that I want to express my gratitude to the MEC for Culture, Sport and Recreation, Mrs. Norah Mahlangu-Mabena in absentia and the sterling work that her Department is doing in resourcing community libraries.

The Mpumalanga Department of Education also welcomes the collaboration between the two departments in the promotion of literacy and support to community libraries.

We are thus happy that in keeping with the campaign to elevate reading to greater heights, the Department of Culture, Sport and Recreation is a key player because it has a role in almost all of these literacy factors, from access to libraries, reading materials and training to promotion and cooperation.
