- Excellence in Technology–Enhanced, Teaching and Learning Award

- Excellence in Mathematics Teaching (GET);
- Excellence in Natural Sciences Teaching (GET);
- Lifetime Achievement Award

Tribute to Teachers

Let me also congratulate each and every educator that is nominated for these awards, I know that it may sound as a cliché, but believe me when I say that just by being nominated, you are of course already a winner. You are counted amongst those educators who are making a difference and agents of change and development in our communities.

Many a time, the role of educators in our communities is taken for granted, many do not sit down and dissect the role of an educator. A Call to Teachers to Stay in the Profession

It our wish as a Department that your good practices can also snowball to the rest of the province and country. The teaching profession has lost a lot of spark and this has a negative effect on the recruitment drive of young persons to teaching. What complicates the situation even worse is the spate of resignation coupled with retirements amongst teachers. We need not experience the misfortunate of reality as expressed by the African proverb which says, if you close your eyes to facts, you will learn through accidents.

I thus want to make a special appeal to all our educators not to take these drastic steps but should consider the repercussions of such action, as some of them are also placing themselves in harm's way. As the pay-out funds resulting from their pensions are speedily depleted within the first year of their resignation.

This is a sorry tale as it pains us to see our former employees suffering at the end. On the other end of the spectrum, the department cannot afford to lose good educators in high numbers. Let us revive the honour and pride of the profession by becoming good role models to our communities through our deeds and actions. We all need to understand the bigger picture and know that the greatest weapon available to the poor to fight poverty and inequality is education. In the absence of education chaos and poverty reigns.

I also want to make a call to our youth and learners to consider taking up teaching as a career and profession so that we could be able to supply the demand for teachers within the province in the light of the huge exodus of teachers generally.
