South Africa joins Mozambique in commemorating Samora Machel

The South African government together with Mozambican government participated in a commemoration event that marked the thirty-fifth anniversary of the death of the first president of Mozambique after independence, Samora Moises Machel, who died in a plane crash on October 19, 1986.

Machel died with 33 individuals who were part of his delegation and they were on their way back from Mbala, Zambia to the Mozambican capital Maputo when the plane crashed into the Lebombo Mountains of Mbuzini, near the Mozambican border.

The South African President Cyril Ramaphosa, who was keynote speaker at the commemoration event said the site on its own is a reminder of the dreadful past from which the two countries come from and the sacrifices that many people made to achieve a better world in which all can enjoy peace, freedom, dignity and equality. He said the commemoration of the death of President Machel and his comrades play a significant role in keeping the memory of those who selflessly laid down their lives for the liberation of the people of Southern Africa alive. "As South Africans, we will never forget the contribution made by President Machel and the people of Mozambique in ensuring that freedom reigns in our country. In commemorating the Mbuzini tragedy, South Africa and Mozambique continue to celebrate the ties of solidarity

and struggle that bind us together," he said. He stated that the monument is also a reminder that the fates of the two countries are inextricably intertwined. "It reminds us that the border that lies just a few hundred metres from where we stand was placed there by foreign powers that had no interest in our history, our heritage or our aspirations. It reminds us that we are born of the same ancestors, that we have shed the same blood, And it reminds us that we share the anguish of this tragedy," he said. In honour of Samora Machel, he requested that the recently established African Continental Free Trade Area to increase Intra-Africa trade and minimise their dependence on the outside world for goods and services. "We are a continent that has an abundance of mineral resources and agricultural produce, but we do not use them for the benefit of our people. By exporting our raw materials, we are also exporting jobs, opportunity and value. We need to reverse this trend and benefitiate our own raw materials to ensure that the continent prospers, that our people have jobs and that our children are healthy, educated and happy," he commented.

Delivering her keynote address, Premier Mtshweni-Tsipane said the fatal plane crash on the 19th of October 1986 robbed not only the people of Mozambique of their first President, but also the oppressed people of South Africa

of a committed liberator.

"It robbed not only FRELIMO a progressive leader, but also the ANC of an ally in the quest to liberate the marginalised majority under the inhumane system of apartheid," she said. She said the tragic events of 1986 have strengthened the strong diplomatic ties between the Republic of South Africa and Mozambique and the two countries will pursue shared objectives as partners for peace and economic prosperity in honour of President Machel.

"The bond between our two nations informed the decision of the Mpumalanga Province to enter into a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with the Province of Maputo to collaborate on mutually beneficial economic and poverty alleviation programmes," she said. "The construction of the Mbuzini Memorial and Museum where we are gathered today, which was declared a national monument, signifies the commitment of the South African Government to honour him for his indomitable legacy. It is a permanent pledge of commitment to the ideals President Machel stood for.

Future generations will learn about the sacrifices that led to democracy and social liberties they enjoy today. We commit ourselves, as the Mpumalanga Province, to preserve the integrity of this sacred site in accordance with our African traditions and in remembrance of the heroes that lost their lives here," she concluded.

The campaign seeks to mobilize citizens countrywide to take the jab with a target of seventy (70) percent by the end of December 2021.

In a province, ranked amongst those with the lowest statistics of unvaccinated people, the 1 million mark inspires hope that communities are slowly but surely embracing the vaccine, which for now, is the only defence mechanism at our disposal to protect us against the COVID-19 pandemic. The rise in the number of vaccinated people is the outcome of the concerted efforts by the Provincial Government, working with a myriad of stakeholders in which door to door visits were conducted to inject people in their own backyards, we had set up 350 vaccination sites across the three Districts, targeting taxi ranks, malls and shopping complex. Another million mark is within reach. We just have to deal with the misinformation associated with the use of the vaccine. The prominent one is that it affects manhood. Such much be refuted vehemently as there is no basis or research to prove it. Let us all vaccinate to save lives.

At the time of going to print, the process of establishing the 6th Local Government Administration was underway, following the successful November 1 elections. The biggest task lying ahead is the delivery of services, a task lying squarely in the hands of this layer of government. With a blend of the young, innovative and the experienced cohort of Councillors, there can never be a proper time to address service delivery than this 6th Administration. Embracing an ethical culture that underpins purpose driven leadership

The Mpumalanga Provincial Government commemorated the Africa Public Service Day (APSD) with the citizens of Thembisile Hani, at the Kwaggafontein community hall.

The day was commemorated under the theme "Building the Africa We Want through embracing an ethical culture that underpins purpose driven leadership in the Context of a Crisis".

The Africa Public Service Day, which is an event celebrated under the stewardship of the African Union, is meant to recognize the institutional contribution made by public servants to enhance the role, professionalism, image and visibility of the public service, as well as to recognize the value and virtue of public service to the community.

Core to the African Union Agenda 2063, is good governance principles of public participation, openness and service delivery to citizens.

In his keynote address, Mr. Makhukhu Mampuru, Director General, Mpumalanga Provincial Government, explained that the rationale behind this theme is premised on AU's aspirations as stipulated in Agenda 2063 whereby Africans desire to build a continent that puts its citizens at the center of all programs and projects.

He said that two of the seven pillars of Africa Agenda 2063 envisions an Africa with a strong cultural identity, common heritage, shared values and ethics, an Africa whose development is people-driven, relying on the potential of African people, especially its women and youth, and caring for children.

He said that these lofty aspirations are underpinned by the African cultural mores that value hard work, strong ethical leadership and one that accrues inclusivity. Mampuru said that COVID-19 has shown that African countries have more to gain by relying on their own structures and regional solidarity than on assistance from elsewhere. With the necessary investment, he believes, the AU theme of the year, although difficult to implement in practical due to the pandemic, could be a key moment that sees the acceleration of pride in Africa's rich culture and heritage amid a world in crisis.

During the event, different government departments showcased and shared information on services delivered by government.

They also informed citizens on innovative means that will guarantee service delivery continuity in the face of the rampaging Covid-19 menace.

The participants were also given an opportunity to reflect and propose interventions that are necessary to facilitate the success of service delivery.

Vooma Vaccination Weekend Campaigns launched in Mpumalanga

The Mpumalanga Provincial Government launched the Vooma Vaccination Weekend Campaigns at Emalahleni from Friday 01 – 03 October 2021. The Vooma Vaccination Weekend Campaign is aimed at mobilizing citizens and people living in South Africa to get vaccinated as a means to fight the COVID-19 pandemic. The public and private health sectors, organized labour and business, and community- and faith-based formations and traditional leaders have joined forces to mobilise communities to take up these additional opportunities. Mpumalanga is one of the three provinces with the least number of vaccinated people after Gauteng and North West with only more than 736 000, which makes up for 24.2 percent.

During the launch of the campaign at Emalahleni, Premier Refilwe Mtshweni-Tsipane was accompanied by the Minister in the Presidency for Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities Ms. Maite Nkoana-Mashabane, MEC for Health Ms. Sasekeni Manzini and eMalahleni Executive Mayor Cllr Linah Malatjie.

They visited designated areas and encouraged people to vaccinate. Amongst the areas visited included the Highveld Mall, the local taxi rank and they also em-

barked on a door to door campaign in Lynnville and ended up addressing people at the Ackerville Stadium.

All vaccination sites throughout the province will be opened during weekends, and the goal for the campaign is to achieve 70 percent coverage of adults who would have vaccinated by the end of December 2021. The Vooma campaign is aimed at helping South Africa ensure that 70 percent of the population is vaccinated by the end of December President Ramaphosa said: "We can all be proud of the more than 350 000 people who seized this opportunity to get vaccinated during hours that were convenient for everyone. "We would have liked this number to be higher but this was a very surge towards greater protection of our nation. "I thank leaders from all sectors of society who successfully mobilised communities to protect themselves. "We also applaud our healthcare workers in the public and private sectors who spent a big part of their weekend on the frontline to administer life-saving vaccines to the nation. "I hope the success of our first Vooma Vaccination Weekend will inspire unvaccinated people to step forward every day of the week and during our Vooma weekends to be vaccinated. "Let's keep up this effort

and ensure inspire who continue to go the extra mile to keep our nation safe."

The Mpumalanga Premier Ms. Refilwe Mtshweni-Tsipane said she was encouraged by the number of people who have come forward to be vaccinated.

"We are optimistic and encouraged by the numbers and looking forward that more people will come to vaccinate," she said. While campaigning at the taxi rank and encouraging commuters to vaccinate, she told them that vaccines are safe and easy to receive.

"They protect people against serious illness, hospitalisation and death. And when the majority of people are vaccinated, the nation will experience a greater sense of freedom and economic activity," she said.

Premier Mtshweni-Tsipane said about 11 000 people across the province have been vaccinated during the launch of the program.

"We will push very hard to maintain the momentum. We are also very pleased to have been joined by Minister Nkoana-Mashabane who has been championing the drive in the Nkangala district. We need to make sure that people come forward and we are going to visit other areas as well," she concluded.

She urged them to be smart, study hard and not to allow societal distractions to steer them off path. She urged them to do their best and build a firm foundation for the next phase of their academic life.

Premier Mtshweni-Tsipane mentioned this during the code of conduct signing ceremony for the 2021 matric class, as they affirmed their commitment to honouring the integrity of the National Senior Certificate (NSC) examinations through the signing of the examination pledge at the Dipaleseng Local Municipality. The ceremony was attended by learners from six high schools from the Local Municipality.

She said that the Mpumalanga Province is ready to successfully oversee the 2021 National Senior Certificate examinations and also expressed her gratitude to the thousands of teachers across the Province who constitute the basic education ecosystem.

"Without you, there would be no examinations. We thank you for moulding and developing young minds so that they develop to become responsible members of our society," she said. Premier Mtshweni-Tsipane said the pledge is a culmination of the 12-year journey of matriculants that their parents and guardians and educators have undertaken in the basic education system.

"By signing this pledge, around 79 857 national senior certificate candidates will join generations of matriculants that have been

moulded by the Mpumalanga Department of Education under the capable and astute leadership of MEC Bonakele Majuba and HOD Lucy Moyane," she said.

She also stated that the cohort of candidates are the second group of candidates that will write their examinations under exceptionally challenging circumstances attributable to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Despite that, she announced that all of the 560 examination centres across the Province are ready and fully compliant with Covid-19 regulations.

"Furthermore all our facilities are equipped with isolation rooms to allow those who are flagged during the screening process to be able to continue to write their examinations.

We urge our students, invigilators and support staff to continue to exercise caution and ensure compliance with Covid-19 regulations such as mask wearing, washing or sanitising of hands as well as exercising social distancing," she commented.

By signing this pledge, Premier Mtshweni-Tsipane said that all candidates commit themselves to not commit any examination related misdemeanors including, but not limited to;

- Bringing unauthorised material into

examination facilities


- Bringing electronic devices such as cell-phones into examination facilities; and
- Unlawfully obtaining and disseminating examination related material such as question papers, and marking memoranda;
- Unduly influencing invigilators to not be impartial in the execution of their roles and responsibilities;
- If any of the candidates in our facilities are found to be guilty of any misdemeanour, we will effect appropriate consequence management measures including disbarment from writing the examination for a minimum of one, and a maximum of three subsequent examinations;
- The harsh consequences are intended to serve as a deterrent for our candidates whilst promoting an irregularity free examination of unquestionable integrity.

"You are now opening a chapter in your life of adulthood of being responsible adults, ready to take life into grater heights. You must go out there be disciplined, act responsible and project our province in a manner that is befitting," she commented.

"We do not have doubts that you will represent us in a manner that you have been taught throughout the thirteen years of your career. As you face the world, I want you to know that the world you are going to travel ahead of you is very bumpy and dauntly, it has so many challenges.

You need to grow on your own so that you face the academic years ahead of you," she concluded.

Over one million people in Mpumalanga are now vaccinated



The Mpumalanga province has vaccinated more than one million people against Covid-19. At least 34,51% of eligible people got their jab. The vaccination programme started early this year with health workers both private and public sector under the Sisonke project. The province is working towards achieving herd immunity so that the province or the country to go back to normal.

The vaccination drive was expanded with pop-up vaccination sites at pension pay points, shopping centers, community halls, churches, taxi ranks, traditional councils, traditional healers contributed to the province reaching the one million mark. The majority of the sites are primary healthcare facilities, which means our services are closer to where people live and work.

Mpumalanga MEC for Health, Ms Sasekani Manzini called on those eligible for the jab to come forward and get vaccinated (12 years of age and above are eligible) Manzini also thanked healthcare workers for the fight against Covid-19. "The department is grateful for our devoted health workers, for your courage, persistence and dedication. We want you to know that your sacrifices mean a great deal to the province" Manzini said.

At 15 November 2021, Mpumalanga had 152 182 diagnosed cases of COVID-19, 99% recovered, active cases are at 0,07% and unfortunately 2 011 COVID-19 related deaths. As we are approaching the festive season lets continue to adhere to all health protocols to prevent the spread of the deadly pandemic.

Government continues to work with traditional leaders to fight Covid-19 pandemic

Dogs take a jab against rabies

September marks the beginning of the Rabies Vaccination season and that means our Veterinary Services staff had to do what they do best: Vaccinating dogs and cats against the deadly disease. September is Rabies Vaccination Month and annually the 28th is World Rabies Vaccination Day, aimed at raising awareness about the impact of rabies on both human and animals and how to eliminate the zoonotic disease.

The Department of Agriculture, Rural Development and Environmental Affairs called on pet owners to take advantage of the free service and vaccinate their dogs and cats against rabies, and also seek medical attention immediately if you bitten by a dog. Pet owners in Kriel and Middleburg heeded the call and did just that, bringing their "best friends" in numbers to be vaccinated.

Meanwhile, pet owners at Rooiboklagte in the Bushbuckridge area gathered for a Rabies awareness and information sharing session with Veterinary Services officials, to mark World Rabies Day. Pet owners had an opportunity to engage officials on Rabies, the facts, the fears and the myths around the deadly but preventable disease. They also had their pets inoculated for FREE, while some were also treated for other health problems and wounds.

Department takes learners to prison as part of crime prevention efforts

Community Police Relations Section in Gert Sibande Region (CPR) identified Ithafa Comprehensive high school for the high levels of criminality and as result, forty (40) of its learners undertook a visit at Standerton Correctional Service Centre.

The purpose of the visit was to expose learners to life behind the bars in order to discourage them from becoming criminals themselves. It is one of the School Safety Programme that the Department of Community Safety, Security and Liaison implements with various stakeholders such as the Department of Education, Correctional Services and South African Police Service (SAPS).

Speaking on the visit, Vusi Dube, Community Liaison Officer (CLO) explained that the Department takes learners to prison with a view of changing their outlook on life especially those who are inclined to delinquent behaviour.

"We want learners to see and experience how prison is so that they can go back to school and be safety ambassadors. We expect these learners to share with their fellow schoolmates the harsh realities of life in prison. This we believe will assist in discouraging them from wanting to pursue life of crime even after they have left the school," Mr. Dube said.

The Correctional services, encouraged learners to enjoy their childhood stage and to stay away from criminal activities. "In life, young as you are you must make choices that will make you successful in life. Furthermore, learners have no business being involved in any gangs. They must focus on their school work," the department said.

The Correctional Officer further discouraged learners from substance abuse stating that it is a gateway to crime, and for them to respect their elders and teachers.

Meanwhile, Mr. Bongani Mahlangu, one of the inmates, impressed upon

the learners not to do crime and end like him, injured or dead, something that he deeply regrets. Mahlangu encouraged learners to stay away from crime because they will end up in prison, injured or dead, "Prison is not a pleasant place to be trust me, therefore you should focus on your studies and respect your elders and teachers at all times," he said.

Marite residents plead for an end to crime

Residents of Marite in Bushbuckridge Local Municipality converged at a local sports ground to air their views regarding the rampant crime in the area.

Among others, they complained about the high incidents of rape, carjackings, housebreaking, murder, robbery at residential premises and murder. Others expressed their unhappiness at the length of time it takes for the police to respond to crime scenes.

They also alleged that some SAPS members were in cahoots with criminals. This, they say, is one of the reasons crime perpetrators were not punished and many were not willing to help the police in solving crime.

The residents further called on the government to fast-track the process of building a police station in Marite. They told the Imbizo that this will help with the swift response to crime in the area and residents will no longer have to travel to Calcutta Police Station to report crime cases.

It is alleged that communities are terrified to give police crime tip-offs because they are

afraid of being victimized.

There are allegations of the existence of gangs, who at times, target trucks that are passing by on the R40 Road. These trucks, once stopped, are dispossessed of goods by armed gangs.

Speaking during the Imbizo, Mpumalanga MEC for Community Safety, Security and Liaison, Vusi Shongwe, pleaded with the communities to work with the police to combat crime.

He reminded them that crime suspects are known in communities and therefore, they should be exposed. He promised the residents that he was going to return to the area with other members of the security cluster unannounced, so that criminals are sniffed out.

The visibly animated Shongwe, also called for the rotation of police stationed in Marite and Calcutta as one of the measures that could help in combating crime in the area.

He also reiterated his call for the optimal utilization of the SAPS Tactical Response Team (TRT), saying it was a critical unit in fighting gang-related crime.

"The few rotten police officers must be flushed

out because they are a disgrace to the uniform and the badge they are wearing. They must be rotated because if they stay too long in Marite, they end up being in cahoots with criminals," said the MEC.

He also mentioned that the government was doing everything possible to end gender-based violence (GBV). He decried men who were like hyenas preying on women and children.

He implored communities to work with the police to eradicate the scourge.

He has called on the municipality to ensure that they improve lighting in the area because the lack of street lights was cited as one of the contributors to crime at night.

Marite is one of the top 30 police stations that contributed mostly to 17 categories of serious crimes reported by communities for the first quarter (April to June 2021).

The Imbizo was supported by the departments of Justice, Correctional Services, SAPS, traditional leadership, and the municipality, among others.



Introduction of coding and robotics

The Mpumalanga Department of Education has embarked on a pilot project to introduce Coding and Robotics in Grade 7 at 128 primary schools in the province.

As a build up to the pilot project, to create awareness and interests amongst learners, an exhibition of Pepper the Robot visiting all primary schools designated as pilot schools for the teaching of the subjects was undertaken. These support visits were part of the collaboration between the Department and Standard Bank in an effort to promote interest in Coding and Robotics as a subject that is being piloted on the 128 schools within the Province.

In as far as the introduction of the subject

is concerned, the Department has already conducted orientation for principals and trained about 300 teachers.

Our learners must be assisted to function in a digital and information-driven world, develop computational thinking skills to support coding as well as all other subjects and to apply digital skills and transfer these skills to solve everyday problems.

To this end, the department will introduce pilot coding and robotics starting with 17 schools for Grade R – 3 and 111 schools for Grade 7. This will be incremental introduction to other grades until Grade 9 in 2024. I have directed that our province must lead from the front

in this regard because we understand the positive impact that Coding and Robotics will have to our learners' development", said MEC Bonakele Majuba of Education.

We will also lobby the private sector to assist us in this drive.

The department intends to extend the pilot project from grade R to Grade 8 in 2022.

The department has also undertaken to expand the number of Technical Schools in the Province. Presently, the province has 40 technical schools in 32 circuits and the goal is to establish one technical school in each circuit.

Currently, only four circuit which do not have a technical school and are earmarked to have technical schools in 2022.

MEC Shongwe encourages truck drivers to use the road considerately

Mpumalanga MEC for Community Safety, Security, and Liaison, Vusi Shongwe has urged truck drivers to use the road in a considerate manner. The MEC was speaking after a recent operation that he participated in on N4 toll road in Schoemanskloof towards Mbombela. He laments that some truck drivers especially at night, tend to speed excessively and without due consideration to drivers of other vehicle types. Shongwe has recently observed about eight trucks driving closely behind each other on a single lane portion on the same route, making it difficult for other motorists to manoeuvre or overtake. The MEC was travelling from Middelburg to Mbombela at the time.

"Such tendencies breed impatience among drivers, and it may lead to serious crashes. The truck industry is a critical part of our economy. Many truckers are careful on our roads. However, some are inclined to reckless

driving especially at night. We have seen some of them breaking the rules, not stopping at intersections and overtaking dangerously among others. We are therefore appealing to truckers and owners to ensure that they play their part in road safety. They should refrain from the bad driver behavior that often endangers the lives of other road users," said the MEC.

He has also called on various trucking organizations and unions representing truck drivers to inculcate a sense of responsible driving among employees. He also encouraged long-distance drivers to plan their trips in such a way that they rest sufficiently along the way. He also mentioned that the Department will continue to engage with the industry to raise road safety awareness on an ongoing basis as part of its road safety education strategy. The MEC has also called on law enforcement officers to show no mercy to any driver

breaking the rules especially as the Festive Season is nearing.

During the recent operation, members of Traffic Intervention Unit (TIU) stopped about 296 vehicles which include 171 heavy motor vehicles.
